SHE is known around the world simply as "the GPS girl", but if you've been chatting to "Siri" on your iPhone 4S, you're listening to the voice of former Mackay girl Karen Jacobsen at work again.

Ms Jacobsen is back in the country at present to fulfil some speaking engagements, but she will also launch a book during her time in Brisbane, and she took some time to talk about her latest speaking evolution as Siri.

While it may seem strange to others, she said she will also fulfil a vision to launch a book at a car dealership during her visit to the country.

"It's always been my vision, and I've found a dealership who agrees with me on that, and it's taking place in Brisbane on Friday night."

"I was apparently a talker right from the beginning. Mum and Dad said I started when I was nine months old, and that was how they knew I was asleep, because that's the only time I stopped talking."
